Cultural Arts Programming  
Scope of Services**

**Programming activities during the 2022-23 funding period include:**

**1) Gallery Exhibitions, 1650 Harrison Street**

Admission is \$7 for adults, \$4 for students/seniors; members free:

Oct. 15, 2022 to Feb. 5, 2023 – *2022 Florida Biennial*, works by 24 Florida-based artists as selected by Guest Juror Ylva Rouse, Senior Curator at MOCA Jacksonville. Gallery 2: Carolina Cueva, solo show in partnership with Oolite Arts.

Feb. 18 to May 21, 2023 – *Living in Oblivion*, works that address information and misinformation in the age of social media. Gallery 2: Oolite Arts Collaborations #5; Gallery 3: Marielle Plaisir solo exhibition

June 3 to Aug. 6, 2023 – *Abstracted*, collaborative, family-friendly exhibition of abstract works by Francie Bishop Good, Karen Snouffler and Sara Stites, with art-making area for gallery visitors. Gallery 2: Solo exhibition by *2022 Florida Biennial* award winner TBD. Gallery 3: Oolite Arts Collaborations #6

Aug. 19 to Sept. 29, 2023 – *Exposed: Annual Exhibition and Fund-raiser*, more than 70 works by artists invited by the Curator to participate. Culminates with a live, closing-night drawing in which every ticket holder goes home with an original artwork from the exhibition. Gallery 2: Solo show by *2022 Florida Biennial* award winner TBD; Gallery 3: TBD

Free Arts! Family Days is presented from noon-4 p.m. on the third Sunday of every month, providing free admission to the galleries with a thematic art-making activity.

**2) Film Screenings and Gallery Events – On Site and Virtual**

Film Screenings: Live or virtual screenings/talks with partnering entities of the Center's *Open Dialogues* documentary short films that focus on equity and inclusion for Broward County's LGBTQ and Black communities: *Stories From the LGBTQ Community* (2020), *Black Voices / Black Stories* (2022), *Stories of Allyship* (winter 2023) and *Student Voices* (spring 2023).

Gallery Events: Receptions, art-making events, and talks/workshops with exhibiting artists and/or guest curators.

### **3) Education for youth ages 5-25 in the visual/performing arts.**

Arts School, 1626 Harrison Street; ArtsPark at Young Circle, 1 Young Circle; Hollywood Central Performing Arts Center (HCPAC), 1770 Monroe Street. Free and fee-based programs open to children and adults, regardless of ability level.

Summer Arts Camp: Sessions, 2-to-4 weeks, for students enrolled in Broadway Actors (ages 9-16), Young Actors, Young Artists (8-10) and Artistic Adventurers (5-7). June 12 to Aug. 11, 2023.

Arts Aspire: Leadership and career development program for ages 14-25, featuring workshops, paid stipends, guest mentors, and program support activities focused on the arts. Enrollment levels for Arts Ambassadors (ages 14-18) and Arts Apprentices (18-25).

Distance Learning Studio: Live teleconference broadcasts delivered via Microsoft Teams to Broward K-12 school classrooms and media centers.

Early Voices Collaborative Exhibitions: Hands-on, inquiry-based, integrated lesson plans presented to educators and children in early-learning centers and K-5 schools; culminating with two unique exhibitions of thematic artworks in the Community Gallery.

Stage Kids and ENCORE: After-school sessions in the performing arts for youth ages 8-18, culminating with a closing-night performance. Fall and winter/spring sessions

ARTastic Artists: After-school weekly sessions in which kid creators ages 7-10 make artworks inspired by well-known artists and art movements. Fall and winter/spring sessions

Community Gallery: Exhibitions of K-12 schools and community art groups at Main Gallery facility, 1650 Harrison Street.

Private voice, instruments, and art lessons, ongoing

**4) Performing Arts:** The Center manages the Hollywood Central Performing Arts Center (HCPAC), at 1770 Monroe Street, on a contract basis for the City of Hollywood. Summer Arts Camp and Stage Kids utilize the theater for about 70 unique class dates or performances. HCPAC hosts up to 100 distinct events presented by outside arts/community entities who rent the theater through the Center; and approximately 30 school events or activities attended K-8 students.

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
