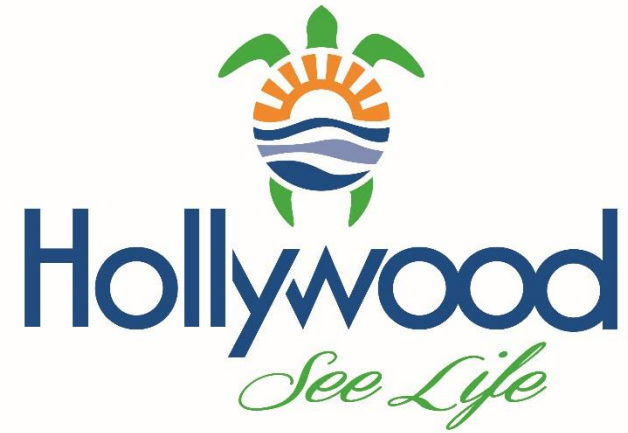


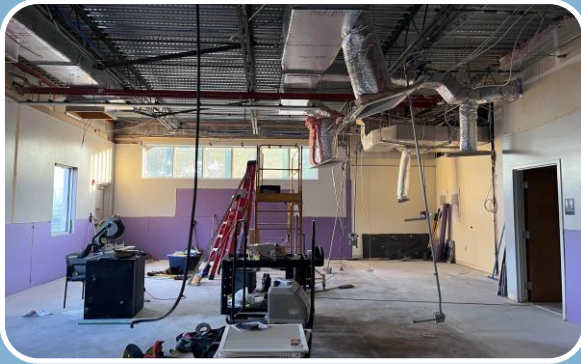

Accomplishments & Impact Overview

Community Development Block Grant (CDBG) Investments



Public Infrastructure Improvements



.Hollywood Boys & Girls Club (1109–1111 N. 69 Way)

- \$250,000 allocated to the expansion and construction of a new Teen Center.
- Total project cost: \$1.5 million

Bob Butterworth Park (5202 Washington Street)

- \$240,000 invested in the development of the COVID Memorial

Proposed Future CDBG Funded Projects include an estimated \$600,000 to Public Works for streetlights and \$400,000 to Parks, Recreation & Cultural Arts for parks equipment

Public Services (CDBG & CDBG-CV)

\$237,000 (\$175,000 in CDBG & \$62,000 CDBG-CV Funding) invested in public services supporting low- to moderate-income residents

.9 nonprofit organizations funded, providing:

- Food assistance for seniors
- Tutoring and STEM education for youth
- Essential supportive services for vulnerable populations

\$1,280,000 encumbered (Hillcrest

Place)

\$.9,027,717 expended to date



HOME Program

\$100,000 to conduct the City of Hollywood Housing Study and Needs Assessment

Tenant-Based Rental Assistance

- Assisted approximately 40 households (serving 250+ individuals)
- Provided critical rental assistance to individuals and families experiencing or at risk of homelessness, helping to stabilize housing situations

Homelessness & Supportive Services (HOME-ARP (American Rescue Plan))

\$150,000 allocated to the Taskforce for Ending Homelessness

- Supporting street outreach and transitional services for the unsheltered population

\$390,000 provided to Broward Outreach Center (The Caring Place)

- Emergency shelter
- Case management
- Workforce development
- Housing placement services

Community Court Program

(U.S. Department of Justice Funded)

Hollywood Community Court
operating in its 3rd year

.Program Outcomes

- 88 Notices to Appear issued
- 383 walk-in clients served this year
- 21 program graduates who obtained housing
- 726 total clients served & 1,349 service referrals provided, connecting individuals to critical supportive services since program inception

Improve neighborhood infrastructure

Support vulnerable populations

Enhance overall community stability

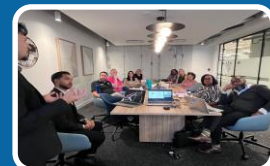

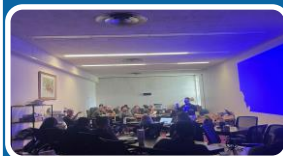
