Organization’s Background: Please provide a concise description of the Applicant Agency, including its history, years of operation, general mission statement, and primary services provided.

Kids In Distress, Inc. (KID) is a nationally accredited agency whose mission is the prevention of child abuse, the preservation of the family and the care and treatment of abused children.

Founded in 1979, KID started as a shelter for abused and neglected children. KID now operates out of two campuses in Broward County, both of which prioritize abuse prevention and family preservation; and provides complete foster care services in both Broward and Palm Beach Counties.

In 2019, KID acquired Family Central, Inc. (FCI) which provides comprehensive family strengthening, early learning, a child care food program, and educational training services in South Florida. FCI is nationally accredited and certified by the International Association of Continuing Education and Training and strives to transform lives through its mission of strengthening relationships and creating nurturing communities where children and families flourish. Both agencies are accredited by the Council on Accreditation (COA). The acquisition of FCI, with operations in Palm Beach, Broward and Miami-Dade, provides KID with the opportunity to benefit even more children and families in South Florida.

Protecting children through treatment and supportive services, KID offers a well-integrated system of care, delivered by skilled professionals who tenaciously strive to encourage, educate, empower and equip children and families with the proper tools to ensure a safe and strong community. Over 21 years ago, KID FIRST was a thoughtful response to address the challenges with which we were watching our clients struggle. One parent households, low income and multiple stressors, many related to parenting, presented often. KID’s infrastructure and experience with this vulnerable population allowed for the implementation of KID FIRST, a program aimed at serving the needs of the whole family, in the home, and that provided assistance with accessing other needed services in the community. The challenges to this population remain and KID FIRST continues to provide these services to preserve and strengthen families whose children are at risk of abuse and neglect, or have come to the attention of the BSO Child Protective Investigations Section.

By advancing critical care to at-risk children and families in need, KID is the premier provider of child and family services in South Florida and together with Family Central, serves more than 40,000 children and families annually. KID employees enrich the South Florida community through family strengthening, kinship, maternal health, foster care recruitment/training/support, a family counseling center, infant mental health, and pediatric dental services in partnership with Nova Southeastern University.

Over the years, KID has seen fluctuations and cycles in policies and society, and has always responded with flexibility and adaptability. That is because its focus remains constant – to provide a continuum of programs and initiatives that are fundamentally based on KID’s core value of family. Our reach continues to expand through programs that are rooted in excellence, yet continue to evolve, reaching possibilities never before imagined.

PROGRAM INFORMATION

1. How does your proposed project address the LETF Category (see above) as well as the Hollywood Police Department's Priority Area?

KID FIRST (Family Intervention Response Support Team) promotes safer neighborhoods by providing weekly in-home supportive services to children and families who are at-risk of abuse and/or neglect, as well as out-of-home child placement due to delinquent behaviors. Supporting families in crisis, KID FIRST strengthens the family by reducing household risk factors, strengthening family protection, and providing services designed to reduce aggressive behaviors between parents/caregivers and their children. KID FIRST responds to multiple family distresses with evidence-based interventions and additional services targeting the needs of all family members. KID FIRST's initial focus is on alleviating existing family crisis and providing case management and parent education to prevent crises from reoccurring. KID FIRST connects families with resources and supports that buffer them against negative community influences, and helps them function as healthy family households within their neighborhoods.

Through parent training, supportive counseling, case management, and community partnerships, KID FIRST diverts youth from the criminal justice system. Many KID FIRST families are low-income households living in neighborhoods with illegal and/or criminal activity. KID FIRST works with families whose children are exhibiting delinquent behaviors, by supporting and strengthening the family to address and eliminate these behaviors. Families are provided with educational tools and supports to help them understand delinquency and establish effective action plans. KID FIRST promotes protective family factors focused on youth social and emotional development, parent and child relationships, nurturing and attachment, parental resilience, social connections, and concrete supports. KID FIRST provides families with the tools they need to decrease risky behaviors.

2. Why is this funding needed (What community problem does it address)? What data suggests this program should be implemented with this population or in this geographical location?

According to the Services and Activities Management Information System (SAMIS), Hollywood families experience significant vulnerabilities. From October 1, 2021 to September 30, 2022, KID FIRST served 17 families in Hollywood and to date, the program has served 20 families.

The families that are referred and enrolled in services through the KID FIRST program have documented risk factors which can include, but are not limited to the following: documented history of abuse and neglect; bonding and attachment disruptions; family conflict and/or stress; substance misuse history; lack of parental understanding of child development norms; severe discipline problems; juvenile justice involvement; low-income, single parent; teen pregnancy; and/or established developmental conditions that impact family functioning.

KID FIRST provides the necessary resources to ensure a safe environment for vulnerable families by targeting children and families residing in at-risk and high-need households and neighborhoods. KID FIRST offers Hollywood families the educational tools and supportive counseling required to alleviate their imminent stressors, risks, and/or crises. KID FIRST employs a combination of best practice models including Healthy Families, Healthy Start, and "wrap-around" Case Management, combined with intervention strategies that include cognitive behavioral interventions, motivational interviewing, and relapse prevention. In addition, KID FIRST utilizes the Strengthening Families Program, which is a 14-session, evidence-based family skills training specifically designed for at-risk households.

The requested funding will enable KID FIRST to sustain and enhance in-home supportive services to children and families in the Hollywood area who are susceptible to child maltreatment and youth delinquency.

3. Program Summary (3-5 sentences): Provide an overview of program services.

KID FIRST (Family Intervention Response Support Team) is a community-based, in-home intervention program that targets at-risk families and has been providing family preservation services in the City of Hollywood for more than 21 years. KID FIRST programming includes home-based crisis interventions and support services for enrolled families available 24 hours a day, seven days a week. KID FIRST services are designed to preserve and strengthen families whose children are at-risk of abuse and neglect, have come to the attention of child protective investigators, and/or are at-risk of experiencing out-of-home placement. KID FIRST reduces the number of children placed in out-of-home care.

4. Describe the program in detail and how it will be implemented: (Describe Who, What, Where, and When)

KID FIRST has successfully provided family preservation services to the most at-risk families in Broward County for more than 21 years. With 14 full-time Family Support Counselors, KID FIRST provides in-home and community-based supports for families in crisis. KID FIRST's program objectives include the following:

- Ensure the protection of children's health and safety.
- Support parents to improve their relationship with their children.
- Assist parents to meet the physical, mental, and emotional needs, in order to care for their children and manage their household.
- Guide parents to provide better care, nutrition, hygiene, instruction, supervision, and discipline for their children.
- Educate parents in household maintenance, budgeting, and financial stability.
- Facilitate families' access to community resources, services, and entitlements including housing, food, clothing, utilities, employment, education, transportation, recreation, and respite care.

KID FIRST Family Support Counselors employ individualized case management and supportive counseling, coupled with parent training to improve family stability, functioning, and overall well-being. These interventions are designed to teach parents positive child development and disciplinary techniques as well as anger and stress management. With the Strengthening Families research and evidence-based curriculum, KID FIRST empowers parents with practical and consistent communication and discipline practices that become a foundation of their family life, and of their children's emotional and social development. KID FIRST addresses families' daily living skills and economic self-sufficiency with employment and budgeting guidance and home safety training (including water and firearm safety, and safe sleep practices). KID FIRST services preserve and strengthen families to decrease child maltreatment, risk of child removal, and out-of-home child placement. The majority of KID FIRST referrals (approximately 85%) are received from Broward County Sheriff's Office Child Protective Investigations Unit. Other KID FIRST referrals are generated by Broward County Schools, local social service providers, and self-referrals. KID FIRST services are provided to at-risk families through flexible scheduling, seven days per week at various times throughout the day to meet families' needs.

The KID FIRST program will measure the following outcomes:

1. 75% of families successfully completed KID FIRST programming and their treatment goals.
2. 80% of families who completed the KID FIRST program improved their family functioning.

The U.S Bureau of Labor Statistics Consumer Price Index for All Urban Consumers (CPI-U) for the Miami-Fort Lauderdale-West Palm Beach indicates that prices rose 9% over the past 12 months. In the past 12 months, KID FIRST families, who often consist of low-income and/or single-parent households, have presented with an unprecedented amount of economic instability especially in the areas of food, housing/utilities, and transportation. Families who are in danger of losing housing and struggling to stretch TANF (Temporary Assistance for Needy Families) funds to buy groceries and pay bills are less likely to engage in and focus on the services being provided. Our current funding from the Children's Services Council of Broward County provides an average of \$200 in Flex Funds per family to provide assistance in these areas and promote engagement, unfortunately it is not enough. The \$10,000 awarded by the City of Hollywood's Police Department LETF would specifically increase KID FIRST's capacity to assist in providing economic stability for City of Hollywood families, engage them in services, and keep them active in our program by having basic needs met. Additionally these funds would provide one Family Support Counselor who serves families in the City of Hollywood with a new laptop computer to continue serving families in the home with reliable technology that facilitates educating families on how to access needed resources and complete applications for benefits such as child care, Medicaid, etc. This laptop would go to staff who would each serve at least 18 families in the City of Hollywood.

5. Describe the Applicant Agency's experience in serving the target population and the capacity of the Applicant Agency to undertake the proposed program.

KID has many community partners and collaborations. We receive funding and maintain alliances with The Children's Services Council of Broward County, United Way of Broward County, ChildNet, Early Learning Coalition, Broward County Children's Services Administration, Healthy Start Coalition, and Broward Behavioral Health Coalition. Our Kinship program has partnered with Memorial Healthcare System (MHS) and collaborated with Legal Aid Services of Broward County (LAS).

KID shares a strong alliance with the Broward County Sheriff's Office Child Protective Investigations Section (BSO CPIS). KID FIRST attends multidisciplinary staffings at BSO. KID receives significant accolades and recognition from CPIS leadership, and this collaboration is essential to the success of family strengthening, preservation, and support services in Broward County.

KID has been providing services to diverse populations in Broward County for over four decades. KID consistently practices individualized, culturally appropriate service provisions addressing clients' cultural background, customs, and needs. KID's cultural competency practices consider several cultural factors, including but not limited to race, ethnicity, national origin, language, spirituality, age, gender, and sexual orientation. In addition, KID considers and prioritizes the culture of family, poverty, and trauma experienced. KID provides cultural diversity, sensitivity, implicit bias, and competency training to all personnel, conducted by experienced trainers. Training covers language barriers, immigration matters, family systems, parenting styles, discipline practices, age-related issues, sexual orientation, and LGBTQ challenges. Training highlights strength-based, family-driven service provision in the context of culture.

KID's staff is representative of the cultural characteristics of its client population. 72% of KID staff and 62% of the KID leadership team belong to minority groups. KID's diverse work force speaks English, Spanish, French, Creole, and Portuguese. Translators for additional languages, including American Sign Language, are utilized as needed. KID values the cultural and linguistic capacities of its staff that directly correlate to service accessibility, quality, and success of its client services.

Client engagement is the key to successful outcomes and client retention. KID uses a family-focused approach that emphasizes highly structured, comprehensive family strengthening with behavioral parent training, family skills, and family therapy components. The immediacy of KID's staff response also successfully engages and retains families. Immediate response builds trust and communicates that staff are invested in a family's welfare.

Staff assist families with basic needs, obtaining services and resources, and resolving crises. Consistency, reliability, and realistic family support planning builds commitment. Program services focus on supporting parents and families, supporting parent-child interaction, and child development. Weekly check ins between sessions by FSCs ensure that there is continuity and retention.

6. Has your agency received funding from LETF? (If yes, identify the source, the \$ amount and provide performance data regarding your contracted outcomes for the various fiscal years your agency was funded).

For 2021-2022, KID received funding in the amount of \$10,000 from the City of Hollywood Law Enforcement Trust Fund (LETF) and \$10,000 from the Broward Sherriff's Office Law Enforcement Trust Fund (LETF).

KID FIRST has a demonstrated history of success as evidenced by the following outcomes, which were achieved during 2021-2022 Fiscal Year:

- 94% of the families completed the KID FIRST program and treatment plan goals.
- 94% of the parents who completed the KID FIRST program improved their family functioning.
- 95% of families have no verified abuse reports 12 months following the program referral date.

The KID FIRST program is comprised of fourteen Family Support Counselors with two supervisors and a total program budget of \$1,590,300. \$10,000 of additional support from BSO LETF will enable KID FIRST to directly assist more families in crisis, reduce the risk of abuse and neglect, and prevent out-of-home placements. With an average of approximately 18 families each year in the City of Hollywood, \$9,025 of LETF funds will directly assist these families with housing, utilities, food and transportation to enable families to meet basic needs and remain engaged in services. The \$9,025 will provide over \$2,000 of assistance each quarter. The program will allocate \$975 to purchase 1 laptop plus carrying case for 1 Family Support Counselor to continue serving families in the City of Hollywood in the home with reliable technology that facilitates accessing needed resources and completing applications for benefits. LETF \$10,000 support, will allow KID FIRST to assist as many families in the City of Hollywood as possible with their day to day needs which promotes program engagement and helps keep our neighborhoods safe.

An individual or entity (Form W-9 requester) who is required to file an information return with the IRS must obtain your correct taxpayer identification number (TIN) which may be your social security number (SSN), individual taxpayer identification number (ITIN), adoption taxpayer identification number (ATIN), or employer identification number (EIN), to report on an information return the amount paid to you, or other amount reportable on an information return. Examples of information returns include, but are not limited to, the following.

- Form 1099-DIV (dividends, including those from stocks or mutual funds)
- Form 1099-MISC (various types of income, prizes, awards, or gross proceeds)
- Form 1099-B (stock or mutual fund sales and certain other transactions by brokers)
- Form 1099-S (proceeds from real estate transactions)
- Form 1099-K (merchant card and third party network transactions)
- Form 1098 (home mortgage interest), 1098-E (student loan interest), 1098-T (tuition)
- Form 1099-C (canceled debt)
- Form 1099-A (acquisition or abandonment of secured property)

Use Form W-9 only if you are a U.S. person (including a resident alien), to provide your correct TIN.

If you do not return Form W-9 to the requester with a TIN, you might be subject to backup withholding. See What is backup withholding, later.
