

2021 State and Local (County) Legislative Priorities

State Policy:

- 1. Preservation of Home Rule and Opposition of Preemption Efforts:
 - Oppose proposed legislation that would erode or impair Home Rule.
 - Oppose proposed legislation that would preempt a municipality's ability to operate as they currently do.
 - Oppose proposed legislation that would task the State with deciding the specific placement of public safety communications systems/towers and force a local government to reimburse the State for such costs (such as SB 1472 from the 2020 Legislative Session).
 - Preservation of the ability to charge a Local Business Tax and maintenance of the current rate for Communications Services Tax.
- 2. Opposition of Cost Shifting and Unfunded Mandates on Local Governments:
 - Oppose proposed legislation that would mandate action on/by municipalities without allocation of State resources to accomplish said action.
- 3. Local Regulation of Short-Term Rentals and/or Party Houses:
 - Oppose legislation which further strips municipalities' ability to regulate frequency and length of stay for properties used as short-term rentals.
 - Support the return of control of short-term rentals to local governments, namely municipalities.
 - Utilize and showcase that the allowance (and success) of local government regulation of shortterm rentals provided pursuant to the Governor's Declared State of Emergency should apply during non-emergency periods as well.
- 4. Anchoring Limitation Areas:
 - Support amending s. 327.4108, Florida Statutes to add North and South Lakes to the list of designated anchoring limitation areas.
 - Coordinate with other relevant stakeholders from across the State to achieve an expansion of anchoring limitation areas.
- 5. Sovereign Immunity and Claim Bill Reform:
 - With an expected proposed overhaul of Florida's sovereign immunity system as well as the threshold to require a claim bill, advocacy to make sure the City is shielded from great financial exposure.

State Funding:

- 1. Protect Previous State Funding:
 - Recurring funding for the Fred Lippman Center.
 - Continuously monitor gaming compact negotiations and advocate for preservation of the local mitigation provision in the Seminole Gaming Compact.



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- 2. Advocate for Continued/Increased Funding:
 - Funding to assist in planning and implementing the closure of the City's ocean outfall.
 - Funding of permitting the sand-by-pass project and beach renourishment.
 - Funding opportunities for septic to sewer conversions (likely via the Department of Environmental Protection).
 - Full funding of the Sadowski Trust fund used for affordable housing.
 - Funding of individual appropriation project requests via the legislative appropriation process.

State Regulatory:

- 1. COVID-19 Pandemic:
 - Continue to serve as a liaison between the City and the Executive Office of the Governor with regard to the State declared public health emergency, executive orders, and reopening protocols.
- 2. Grants and Other Funding Opportunities:
 - Continue to provide the City with funding opportunities via executive-branch state agencies, with a focus on drawn-down federal funds related to the pandemic (i.e. CARES Act funding).
- 3. Coordination with Relevant State Agencies:
 - Continued coordination between the City and executive-branch state agencies on matters which
 involve city operations (i.e. Department of Transportation, Department of Environmental
 Protection, Department of Economic Opportunity, and Division of Emergency Management).

Local Policy and Funding:

- 1. Funding and permitting of sand-by-pass project and beach renourishment.
- 2. Use of Tourist Development Taxes and/or Port Everglades revenues to fund the Segment #3 renourishment and ongoing sand by-pass costs.
- 3. Use of Tourist Development Taxes toward expenses that promote the City of Hollywood as a destination.
- 4. Implementation of the Transportation Surtax fund construction program.
